5. Acknowledge donations made by Riverside County 3rd District Supervisor, Jeff Stone
Mayor Youssef, thanked Supervisor Stone for his donations and continued support of the City of Hemet.

Ron Bradley, Interim City Manager, expressed appreciation for Supervisor Stone's support.

Supervisor Stone, expressed pleasure in his ability to help the City of Hemet in its time of need. I like to help the Cities that need the help and attention and that right now is Hemet and San Jacinto. I am very proud to participate regionally with the issues that face the San Jacinto Valley. I have been outspoken in my opinion that the City of Hemet should conduct RFP's for Public Safety services. I am very proud of your City Council's courage to consider all options and will support them with any decision they make. Police and Fire are heroes regardless of the color of their uniform. The RFP process led this Administration and City

Council to realize the importance of a paramedic program and included it in the City's proposed budget.

My goal for the next 3.5 years is to focus on the San Jacinto Valley and continue as a partner to help make this valley safe again increasing the quality of life for the residents. We need to create jobs and stimulate economic development. Supervisor Stone encourage the City Council to keep up the good job and pledged to work together to make this Valley the best it can be.

Mayor Youssef, presented a Certificate of Appreciation to Supervisor Stone. No one achieves success alone the City is grateful to have you as a partner.

Mayor Pro Tem Smith, as a member of WRCOG the City of Hemet participates in the "HERO" Program offering solar, A/C and heating upgrades. Mayor Pro Tem Smith presented WRCOG's HERO cape to Mayor Youssef for the City's participation in the program.

Bob Jungbluth, Hemet, recommended that the City Council approve this item. Glad that the Police Officers will get some help.

Council Member Krupa moved and Council Member Wright seconded a motion to approve this item as presented. Motion carried 5-0.

Item No 16.A

Mayor Pro Tem Smith, I want to confirm that the developer has met all of the City's requirements.

Deanna Elliano, confirmed that Raintree has been working diligently to get this open and meet all of the requirement so that the park can be open and available to the residents for the 4th of July.

Council Member Milne moved and Mayor Pro Tem Smith seconded a motion to approve this item as presented. Motion carried 5-0.

Public Hearing

17. **Registration Fee for Abandoned, Foreclosed or Vacant Property** – Community Development Director Elliano
 - a. Adopt a resolution establishing fee amounts for the registration of abandoned or foreclosed property within the City of Hemet pursuant to Chapter 14, Article XI of the Hemet Municipal Code. **Resolution No. 4544**

Deanna Elliano, Community Development Director, this Resolution requires a public hearing since it sets a fee that will allow for the costs recovery amount of \$146.00 to process the registration of abandoned, foreclosed or vacant property. There are over 500 properties that have been sent default notices. Registration and the fee is due by September 1, 2013.

Mayor Youssef declared the Public Hearing opened at 7:36 p.m.

Bob Jungbluth, Hemet, asked if his concern with open sewers in vacant homes will be addressed with this Resolution.

Ms. Elliano, the Ordinance that the City Council previously adopted will give staff the ability to begin addressing Mr. Jungbluth's concern.

Mayor Youssef declared the Public Hearing closed at 7:39 p.m.

The City Council requested that staff keep the public informed on the number of properties that are getting in compliance with the new Hemet ROCS Ordinances.

Council Member Milne moved and Council Member Wright seconded a motion to approve this item as presented. Motion carried 5-0.

Discussion/Action Items

18. **Agreement with Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District for Professional Facility Management of the James Simpson Memorial Center** – Interim Assistant City Manager Thornhill

- a. Authorize the City Manager to enter into a Professional Services Agreement with Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District for professional facility operation management services of the James Simpson Center for a period of three (3) years, for an amount not to exceed \$287,654 annually or a total amount of \$862,962 over a period of three (3) years.

Gary Thornhill, Interim Assistant City Manager, staff is recommending that the City Council consider approving a Professional Services Agreement with Valley-Wide Recreation and Park District for the management of the Simpson Center. The previous agreement was with the YMCA that went bankrupt in January 2013. Valley-Wide stepped in and took over the management of the facility with very short notice to offer services to the residents. Since their inception, they have increased services and made esthetic improvements. The City did an RFQ and received two responses. Valley-Wide is already doing a great job offering the services that the residents need. Exceed is a great program that needs to be supported by the City. Mr. Thornhill recommended that the City Council and staff take the time to tour Exceed's facility. This agreement is for a period of 3 years.

Council Member Wright, asked if future agreements can require that utilities be paid by the service provider instead of the City.

Mr. Thornhill, this agreement requires the utilities be paid by Valley-Wide up to \$40,000, the City only pays if they exceed that amount.

Dean Wetter, Valley-Wide, JJ Edwards has done a great job continuing previous services as well as establishing new programs at the Simpson Center. 10,000 people have used the facility since March. Mr. Wetter told the City Council about the current and proposed services offered and improvements that have been made to the facility. Mr. Wetter thanked the City Council for the opportunity to operate the facility.

The City Council thanked Dean Wetter and Valley-Wide for stepping up and continuing the programs for seniors.

Ron Bradley, Interim City Manager, if the weather forecasters are correct, we have triple digit temperatures approaching. The Simpson Center will be open as a cooling center for residents.

Mayor Pro Tem Smith moved and Council Member Krupa seconded a motion to approve this item as presented. Motion carried 5-0.

19. **Resolution Revising Rules of Decorum for Public Meetings** – City Attorney Vail

- a. Adopt a resolution adopting revised rules of decorum applicable to the personal conduct of individuals attending meetings of the City Council, Planning Commission, library Board, Housing Authority and all other subsidiary or advisory boards, commissions, or committees of the City Council of the City of Hemet.

Resolution No. 4545

Eric Vail, City Attorney, the ability for the public to participate is the hallmark of our democracy. The City Council agrees that the public should participate. The law agrees that this right is limited not absolute. The law in California recognizes that reasonable recommendations can be made. The law allows the City Council to adopt by resolution establishing rules on how public hearings, public meetings and public comments will be handled. Staff is recommending the following changes to the City's existing rules of decorum adopted in 2010. Mr. Vail gave the City Council a powerpoint presentation regarding the recommended changes. The main reason to adopt rules of decorum is to conduct an orderly, efficient and fair meeting. This allows people to participate, hear and not feel intimidated. Maintains respect and decorum in this civil function. This resolution prohibits members of the public from approaching the seating area of the Meeting Body. It prohibits members of the public from eating or drinking anything other than water in the Council Chambers. It requires members of the public to remain seated or in an area designated for standing unless approaching the podium to speak or entering/exiting the room. Aisles and doorways must be kept clear. The resolution provides rules for those who video or audio record meetings to ensure that their recording does not interfere with the orderly conduct of the meeting or the ability of others to view, hear or participate in the meeting. It allows the presiding officer to reduce speaker time to two minutes if it appears 15 or more persons are going to speak on an item. It provides rules applicable to persons who speak on behalf of other individuals and the aggregating of speaker time. It also provides rules on the display of video or audio recordings during public comments on items not on the agenda. These revised rules will provide the Meeting Body with clear guidance as to what is and is not allowed at public meetings so that all persons attending and speaking at a public meeting are treated in the same manner.

Patty Woods, Hemet, expressed concern that this resolution will further stifle the public. The City Council is supposed to be here to listen to the residents. I have never been disrespectful I just say things that you don't like. Where are the rules for the City Council? Council Members have been rude to the speakers. There needs to be some rules for the conduct of the City Council. Some of the Council Members campaigned on less government, but that is not what is happening.

Paul Raver, Hemet, understands the need to have rules and agrees with most of them. Mr. Raver expressed disappointment that the Council Members will not engage in conversation with him. Mr. Raver also recommended that the City Council not approve the reduction in speaking time for the public. Mr. Raver does support the recommendation to allow speakers with donated time up to 15 minutes.

Council Member Milne, the 2 minute rule is very common when there are a lot of people speaking. After a while the speakers say the same thing over and over. This resolution does not stifle speakers, Hemet encourages participation. Many other cities have more stringent rules. The City Council wants to hear from everyone and these rules are very common in other cities.

Council Member Krupa, it is unfortunate that it is necessary to have rules of decorum in place to manage the audience. The City Council is paying attention, sometimes we take notes or looking at the agendas on our Ipads.

Mr. Vail, the Mayor can reduce the speaker's time to 2 minutes when there are a large number of people just saying the same thing. The idea is to encourage people to get a representative to speak. The City Council does have rules of decorum.

Council Member Krupa, asked the City Attorney to explain the rules regarding engaging the public on matters not on the agenda.

Mr. Vail, the Brown Act does not allow the City Council to engage in a debate or discussion on items not listed on the agenda. The City Council can engage in a discussion with the public on any specific agenda item as long as it is relevant, meaningful and in the City's business.

Mayor Pro Tem Smith moved and Council Member Krupa seconded a motion to approve this item as presented. Motion carried 5-0.

20. **Ad Hoc Committee Recommendation for Special Event/Community Event funding for 2013-2014 Fiscal Year** – Community Investment Director Jansons

- a. Approve the recommendation of the City Council Ad-Hoc Committee to fund Community Events in the amount of \$25,000 for fiscal year 2013-2014.

John Jansons, Community Investment Director, the special event funding process has been very successful. The City received 25 applications equaling \$76,000. The City Council has earmarked \$25,000 for special events, reviewing applications and formulating a recommendation was a tough job for the Ad Hoc Committee.

Council Member Krupa, explained the Committee's reasons for their recommendations. Council Member Krupa recommended that some events be line items in the budget considering their economic impacts to the Valley.

Council Member Wright, scoring was based on the information provided. Some of the applicants didn't follow the directions although their request had merit.

The City Council discussed events such as the Tinsel Tri and the Ramona Pageant. These events advertise broadly and are great economic drivers.

Lori VanArsdale, Ramona Bowl Association, 76.69% of the attendees this year came from out of town from 17 states and Canada. The Ramona Bowl Association tries to give back to the community by donations such as the use of the Bowl for events. As always the support of the City of Hemet is appreciated.

Mayor Pro Tem Smith, the cities of Coachella and Indio get funding from RCTC for transportation for their events. We need to request funding assistance for transportation costs for the Ramona Bowl events.

Andy Anderson, Hemet-San Jacinto Chamber of Commerce, thanked the City Council for their consideration. We understand the limitations in funding. Please keep us in mind if additional funding comes available.

Council Member Milne, requested more accountability for all recipients of these tax payer funds. A report on our investment should be required.

The City Council directed staff to workstudy the Event Process at a future meeting. The City Council directed staff to request a report back from all funded events to determine the return on investment. Council Member Milne moved and Council Member Wright seconded a motion to approve this item as presented. Motion carried 5-0.

21. **Sponsorship of 4th of July Celebration** – Community Investment Director Jansons
- a. Award a sponsorship of \$6,000 toward the cost of producing the 4th of July celebration by Valley-Wide Parks and Recreation District.

John Jansons, Community Investment Director, another way to celebrate the heritage, harmony and health in the valley is through this community pride event. Valley-Wide Parks and Recreation is requesting that the City Council sponsor the annual 4th of July Celebration in the amount of \$6,000.

Dean Wetter, Valley-Wide, apologized for presenting their request after the deadline. The event is wonderful and sponsored by the City of San Jacinto and the County of Riverside.

Council Member Milne moved and Mayor Pro Tem Smith seconded the motion to approve this item as presented. Motion carried 5-0.

Reconvened at 9:24 p.m.**

22. **Municipal Code Amendment 13-004 pertaining to the Issuance of Administrative Citations** – Community Development Director Elliano
- a. Introduce, read by title only and waive further reading of an ordinance regarding amendments to the Hemet Municipal Code in an effort to refine the procedures related to the imposition, enforcement, collection, and appeal of administrative citations, fines and penalties **Ordinance Bill No. 13-029**; and
 - b. Direct staff to file a Notice of Exemption with the County Clerk in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act.

Deanna Elliano, Community Development Director, this ordinance went before the Hemet ROCS CAC on May 24, 2013. This ordinance will update existing Municipal Code sections making it easier to find and amends the procedures.

Mayor Pro Tem Smith moved and Council Member Milne seconded a motion to introduce, read by title only and waive further reading and direct staff to file a Notice of Exemption. Motion carried 5-0.

The ordinance was read by title only.

23. **Municipal Code Amendment 13-005 pertaining to the Declaration and Abatement of Public Nuisance Conditions** – Community Development Director Elliano
- a. Introduce, read by title only and waive further reading of an ordinance amending Chapter 30 of the Hemet Municipal Code regarding public nuisances and the associated regulations that will promote the maintenance of real property and enhance the appearance, habitability, occupancy, use and safety of all structures and premises within the City **Ordinance Bill No. 13-030**; and
 - b. Direct staff to file a Notice of Exemption with the County Clerk in compliance with the California Quality Act.

Deanna Elliano, Community Development Director, this is an update to an existing ordinance. This Ordinance expands and clarifies the 45 public nuisances in response to the community's request. This will help the City raise the quality of life and led to stable good quality housing and maintenance conditions. This Ordinance also gives staff the ability to recover associated Code Enforcement costs.

Patty Woods, Hemet, asked if this Ordinance will address the issues with the property located on the southwest corner of Carmalita and Acacia.

Council Member Wright, any property that looks like that should be dealt with, I hope this ordinance helps.

Council Member Milne, everyone will be held to the same standards. This ROCS Ordinance took what we had and is taking it a step further. There are several homes and businesses that are in poor condition.

Council Member Wright moved and Council Member Krupa seconded a motion to introduce, read by title only and waive further reading and direct staff to file a Notice of Exemption. Motion carried 5-0.

The ordinance was read by title only.

24. **FY 2013-2014 Proposed Budget** – Interim City Manager Bradley

- a. Adopt a resolution adopting the Budget for the City of Hemet and approving appropriation for the Fiscal Year Commencing July 1, 2013 and ending June 30, 2014. **Resolution No. 4546**

Ronald Bradley, Interim City Manager, the proposed budget will need to be amended to include an allocation for ICSC and the \$6,000 that was approved tonight for Valley-Wide.

Steve Sandefer, Hemet Fire Fighters Association, expressed concern with the \$4.5 million deficit. The Fire Department is confident that we will come in under budget this fiscal year. The Fire Department is aware of the City's financial situation and will work cooperatively with the Fire Chief.

Paul Raver, Public Safety Coalition, presented a document to the City Council that included his recommendations. Mr. Raver recommends that the City Council open Fire Station No. 5. Mr. Raver recommended that a fee for ALS or BLS services be considered. Mr. Raver disagrees with funding the EMD and/or paramedic programs for 12 months and recommended that they be funded in the budget for 8 months. Mr. Raver also suggested that any cost savings from negotiations with HFFA be used for the new programs.

Council Member Wright, appreciates the addition of the EMD and Paramedic programs however the \$900,000 estimate is a concern. Council Member suggested that this allocation not be approved at this time. We need to look closer at these costs and consider phasing in these programs.

Mr. Bradley, the Fire Department's proposed budget was prepared by Chief Morris. The \$900,000 is my estimate for the two programs. If funding and/or assistance is available there might be a savings at the end of the year. In a meeting this morning with Chief Morris, the EMD program will reduce the number of calls. The City has not negotiated with the Fire Department as of yet regarding the stipend for Paramedics. The City Council still has a decision to make on the RFP process. Mr. Bradley recommended that the City Council adopt the proposed budget. After the completion of the negotiations the City Council can challenge the numbers presented as well as CalFire's numbers. The budget can be amended at a later date.

Council Member Wright, asked how soon the programs can be implemented and when the funds will be expended.

Mr. Bradley, We are using money this year that we could have put in the back, this City needs to make an investment.

Mayor Youssef, recommended that the budget as proposed be considered. Adjustments can be made at mid-year.

Council Member Krupa, confirmed that within six months the City Manager will have a plan to pay back the reserves. This City Council and staff needs to make economic development a priority. We can not take \$4.5 million dollars out of reserves every year.

Mayor Pro Tem Smith, expressed concern with using \$4.5 million dollars from the City's reserves.

Council Member Milne, the City still has a structural deficit. The City Council needs to continue to look at ways to cut operating costs.

Council Member Krupa moved and Mayor Youssef seconded a motion to approve this item as presented. Motion carried 5-0.
